Hornsea church starts Job Club

St Nicholas Church, Hornsea, has opened the town's first Job Club. The Job Club will be run from the parish hall every Monday morning from 9am to 12.30pm. Job seekers from the town can receive coaching for interviews and help finding jobs online, and local jobs will be displayed on a vacancies board.

The job club was started by the Revd Phil Lamb, vicar of St Nicholas Church (*pictured with Yvonne Hird*). Phil said, "Hornsea's a big town, and there are new estates being built here all the time. But there's no support for people who are unemployed here. If you've got no job, you've got to find the money to travel to Beverley or Hull to go to a job centre. So we wanted to open a job club here to help Hornsea folk who are struggling to find work.

"The church has to take a lead in helping people in need. Jesus teaches us to love our neighbour, and that's what we're trying to do here. In 2011 the church opened the first Foodbank in East Yorkshire, to help



people going hungry, and now we're helping people who are unemployed. If we're serious about loving our neighbour, we have to look at the areas where they are struggling and do what we can to help.

"We're not experts, so we'll be learning alongside the people who are coming to the job club, but we believe we can make a difference. One of our volunteers, Yvonne Hird, has experience of job clubs and will be running coaching for interviews with people, to give job seekers more confidence. Opening a job club is something that any church can do, if there's a need in their community."

The joy of good news for all

Good news! My daughter's had a lovely baby! My friend is recovering from his illness! At long last I've got a job I can enjoy!

When we have good news we are ready to share it. We know that other people will be interested and want to share our joy. This joy is the theme of Jesus' teaching in St Luke's Gospel chapter 15: the joy of the shepherd who finds his lost sheep and brings it home. The joy of the poor woman who finds her silver coin, lost from her meagre savings. The joy of a father who welcomes home his lost son, prodigal son, and still loves the son who never left home.

No wonder that Pope Francis called his guidance on sharing the good news of Jesus *The Joy of the Gospel*. Back in Lent clergy from across our diocese joined with Roman Catholic colleagues from the Diocese of Middlesbrough to learn from this exciting and challenging book. Together we explored the Pope's encouragement to be grateful as we remember what God has done for us in Jesus. We were challenged by the Pope's insistence that "God's heart has a special place for the poor". We were sent out to be "Spirit-filled evangelizers who work and pray". As Francis puts it, "the primary reason for evangelizing is the love of Jesus which we have received".

Yet we know we are not always very good at sharing the good news we

have found in the love of Jesus. It's fine to speak about the joy of the gospel, but letting it affect how we talk to others is another matter! Most of us still feel awkward chatting about our faith even though it is very important to us.

So another way we are looking to help us all gain some confidence and have some practical ideas is through running a *Leading your Church into Growth* conference in September. About 30 benefices from across the diocese have signed up, each sending a team of vicar and two lay people. This isn't a magic wand but experience in many places, including a few of our parishes, shows that the ideas proposed are achievable and can be adapted to your circumstances. Over time churches can develop new ways of sharing the good news about Jesus, the joy of the gospel, and see others become disciples of Jesus.

I believe this conference and what will follow on is good news for us! And we can look forward to sharing that joy with those we meet!

Church Urban Fund promotes “frugal lunches” for Poverty Sunday



The Church Urban Fund (CUF) is encouraging parishes to take part in activities for Poverty Sunday.

Local churches are being invited to hold a Poverty Sunday Service followed by a “frugal lunch” on 21 June, or on another date that suits, to raise funds for CUF. A “frugal lunch” involves replacing a normal Sunday lunch with soup or another inexpensive meal, with the savings donated to the Church Urban Fund. Paul Hackwood, CUF Executive Chair, said: “We believe this is an important time for churches to get involved. Great work is already being done but the need is immense. The more we can raise money, the more lives are going to be transformed.”

In this Diocese, Together Middlesbrough and Cleveland (TMC) is the local response of

Church Urban Fund, working in partnership with the Diocese of York. The project has been working across Middlesbrough for over 2 years and is expanding its work into Redcar and Cleveland. Working with local churches and Christian activists TMC has supported the development of a variety of projects including Food Banks, support for asylum seekers and refugees, the Positive Pathways project supporting homeless people and Hope 4 Summer - summer activities for vulnerable families and children.

Heather Black, Development Officer with TMC said: “At a time when local families and individuals are struggling with the basic necessities of food, warmth, shelter and clothing, and many are experiencing isolation and loneliness, the church is actively responding in Christ’s name. It is often simple acts of human kindness shared with love that can bring hope and enable human flourishing.”

St Hilda's Way

A new 42 mile Whitby pilgrimage, St Hilda's Way, is being launched on Sunday 28 June. St Hilda's Way starts at Hinderwell and finishes at Whitby Abbey, visiting eight churches and chapels dedicated to St Hilda, as well as two other churches named after St Hedda and St Mary. At each location there is a special focus on a different aspect of the Saint's life, something to find in the church and the opportunity for reflection and meditation.

On Sunday 28 June the Way will be launched with a special service at St Hilda's Holy Well at Hinderwell Church, led by the Rt Revd Paul Ferguson, the Bishop of Whitby. There is then a led pilgrimage and the first leg of the trail, from Hinderwell to Scaling Dam, will be walked that afternoon. The full walk will be completed over the following five days, culminating on the cliff top at Whitby Abbey on Friday 3 July.

The idea for St Hilda's Way came from the churches in Whitby, inspired by the icon of St Hilda written by Edith Reyntiens. Veteran long-distance walkers the Revd Nancy and John Eckersley, have lent their assistance in devising the route and writing the guidebook.

The guidebook has extracts from the Ordnance Survey OL27 map covering the route in short sections of between two and six miles. Nancy has taken most of the photos and written the majority of the 'special interest' content. John has devised the route.

The route for the inaugural walk is:

Day 1 - Sunday 28th June

- 11.00 am – Service of Blessing at St Hilda's Well, Hinderwell
- 12.00 noon – Picnic Lunch
- 1.30 pm – Start of walk – Hinderwell to Scaling Dam

Day 2 – Monday 29th June

- 9.30 am – Meet at Scaling Dam Visitor Centre car park
- Walk – Scaling Dam to Danby Station to Danby Church

Day 3 – Tuesday 30th June

- 10.00 am – Meet at National Park Visitor Centre, Danby
- Walk – Danby to Lealholm to Glaisdale to Egton Bridge

Day 4 – Wednesday 1st July

- 9.30 am – Meet St Hedda's Church, Egton Bridge
- Walk – Egton Bridget Mortuary Chapel to Egton to Sleights

Day 5 – Thursday 2nd July

- 9.30 am – Meet Sleights Railway Station
- Walk – Sleights to Sneaton to Whitby Railway Station

Day 6 – Friday 3rd July

- 9.30 am – Meet Whitby Railway Station
- Walk a Church Town Trail to visit St Hilda's RC Church, St Hilda's Priory, St Hilda's CofE Church, St Mary's Church, Whitby Abbey

New Altar for Rievaulx Abbey

On 4 June Archbishop Sentamu, accompanied by the Bishop of Whitby; the Roman Catholic Bishop of Middlesbrough; the Prior of Ampleforth and the Chair of the Methodist District of York and Hull, will dedicate the newly built high altar at Rievaulx Abbey.

A member of our congregation, Chris Bryant, now sadly deceased, but a generous benefactor to this project and churches across the denominations in Helmsley, initiated the vision to return Rievaulx Abbey to being a living witness to the Christian Gospel now, in this twenty first century. Funding from three anonymous donors from overseas has also been found through the Archbishop of York. Worship has continued sporadically on this site since its dissolution in 1538. This restoration of the altar re-establishes permanent sacramental presence in Rievaulx Abbey.

We are very grateful to English Heritage for supporting and executing the building up of the altar.

Holy Rood House celebrates 21 years as a centre for Creative Arts in Health and Well-being



In the picturesque village of Sowerby, just a short walk from Thirsk, are two beautiful old houses, one of which was the house of Miss Warner, alias Mrs Pumphrey with her famous Pekinese, Tricky-Woo, from *All Creatures Great and Small*. These are the centre of the Holy Rood House community.

On St David's day, the house was filled with celebration and a toast is raised to give thanks to the creative God for the 21st anniversary of the place of Creative Arts in Health and Well-being. Holy Rood House is a centre of health and pastoral care which uses creative arts to help and heal the guests who stay there.

Inside the house are works of art, some beautiful, some simply strange blots and swirls of colour, all created

for therapeutic purposes. The idea is to use artistic mediums such as painting to take all your worries and troubles and let them out through the body and into the art. They are not created to look aesthetically pleasing or to be put on display, but many of them are stunning and packed with emotion and meaning.

Lots of the people celebrating were community companions, a group of people from around the country who support the work of the house; many of whom have had first-hand experience of the therapeutic activities of painting, sketching, moulding clay and weaving as a way to heal and relax. They believe that creative arts are a gift from God integral to healing, and that they are vital to individuals and to communities.

The guest of honour at this celebration was Tom Ramsden (*pictured left with art therapist Elaine Wisdom, and right with Holy Rood Director the Revd Elizabeth Baxter*), High Sheriff of North Yorkshire, who shares this community's passion for the arts. In his year in office Mr Ramsden has been working to set up an exciting project called 'Arts for Change', a fund which aims to promote the arts and use them as a way of transforming people's lives. This will bring fantastic opportunities for charities, groups and individuals to apply for funding and use it to spread the benefits of the arts around the area.

I asked him whether he was an artist himself. Although he claims he isn't himself, he says his mother, a trustee and valued supporter of Holy Rood House, and his wife and daughter are all very artistic. Being surrounded by creative people, the arts have clearly had a huge influence on his life, and given him a passion for spreading their joy and benefit.

Cherishing Churchyards Week

Why not celebrate the beauty of your churchyard or burial site with your local community during National Cherishing Churchyard Week from Saturday 6th June - Sunday 14th June?

Caring for God's Acre, the charity dedicated to the conservation of burial sites of all kinds is promoting National Cherishing Churchyards Week and helping people to organise events which celebrate these special places in the heart of our communities.

For instance a rich diversity of plant and animal life can be discovered in burial sites and they often contain distinctive and veteran trees such as Yew trees, the oldest living things in Britain. The stonework of the memorials and boundary walls provides a home for a mosaic of mosses, ferns and lichens. Burial sites are also important places for archaeology and history, providing

an accessible resource for community learning. Most important of all - they provide a tranquil place for remembrance and quiet reflection.

Events offered during Cherishing Churchyards Week could include activities for families such as a quiz, a mini beast safari, tree bingo, letter or leaf rubbing, making gargoyles out of clay. Open days could be held with guided tours. Volunteer activity days such as making compost areas, scything grass, memorial recording, bramble clearing, nest box making. Special workshops could be organised in dry stone walling, memorial safety and care, plant identification, geology, tree care or creative writing and art.

This year's theme for York St John's summer symposium on the Challenge of Leadership in a Changing Church is "The Contribution of Faith to Reconciliation", to be held on 3rd June.

In this our fourth Symposium we aim to bring together significant contributors to present and debate the positive role which faith can make to reconciliation. Faith leaders at local, national and international levels have a responsibility to be as informed as possible about the particular contribution which they can make. In this Symposium we aim to offer the latest thinking accompanied by engaged dialogue on this vital subject.

The Keynote Speaker is Toby Howarth, Bishop of Bradford in the newly-created Diocese of West Yorkshire and The Dales. His previous post was as the Archbishop of Canterbury's Interfaith Adviser. He has worked in India and has a doctorate in the study of Islamic preaching.
